A Letter from the Rural Dean

Dear Friends,

It's only the end of November, but everywhere I turn I see Christmas decorations. Trees, lights, tinsel and baubles are decking homes and businesses, towns and villages; Christmas songs are being broadcast through the sound systems; there is even a radio channel I can pick up in the car which plays non-stop Christmas music. The first Christmas card arrived through my letterbox today. There is a magic to Christmas, and that sense of magic and wonder has captured the minds and imaginations of the world — the baby, the manger, the shepherds, the angels, the wisemen, Mary and Joseph.

The message of Advent is a less comfortable one, because it focuses not only a cuddly new-born infant, but on the certainty of judgement, that Christ will return as judge of the living and the dead. As Christians we should be conscious that it is Advent that expresses our ultimate hope and longing — Christmas is only the prologue, the introduction. The joy of Christmas, the wonder at the incarnation, should never overshadow the reality that Christ is coming again. We should live each day as people who are ready and waiting, with our lamps trimmed, our houses in order, that if Jesus returns now he does not find us asleep. If Christ comes or calls today, are you ready?

As we kneel at the manger throne this year, and sing our joyful carols and praises, let us always be conscious that we are a waiting people, waiting for that day when every knee on heaven, in earth and under the earth will bow at the precious name of Jesus, and every tongue confess that he is Lord. On that day, all our prayers will fund their fulfilment as the Kingdom of God will finally come, on earth as in heaven. Until then, let us fix our eyes, our hearts and our minds on the babe of Bethlehem, crucified, risen and ascended, pray for his coming as our judge and as our Saviour, and prepare our hearts to be ready for that great day.



A Christmas Gift

It's not easy getting the right Christmas present for others, especially in these uncertain times. However, the Magi's gifts were entirely appropriate and help us to understand God's gift of Jesus to us.

'On coming to the house, they saw the child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh.' (Matt 2:11). These were the expensive kind of gifts that visitors from the east would bring: gold, frankincense (a plant gum resin used in incense) and myrrh (another resin used in perfumes).

Who is He?

Gold is a gift for a king. In Jesus, we see a king in baby clothes. The worship of the wise men was costly, not only in terms of their gifts but for their lives.

Why did He come?

Frankincense was used by the priests in the temple in offering sacrifices. Jesus, as the ultimate priest, is the one who came to bring God and man together. He could do this because He is both divine and human.

What did it cost Him?

Myrrh was used to embalm the dead. This gift reminds us that the baby of Bethlehem would die on the cross to give His life for us. The wood of the crib and the cross are the same wood!



Requirements for In-Building Worship Services

Watch Social Media for current updates and guidelines.



In line with recent correspondence from the Archbishop the following restrictions are still in place:

Social Distancing – We are still required to stay at a social distance of 1 metre from each other while at "In-Building" worship.

Seat Allocation – Pews/ Seats will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. The Church has to fill from the front and empty from the back, row by row. Once all available seats are used then no one else is permitted to enter. We are temporarily making our services a ticket only event – meaning that those who wish to come need to book online or phone the Parish Office and reserve a place each week.

Track and Trace – a list of everyone in attendance needs to be kept for the purposes of Track and Trace. For 21 days. This is in line with GDPR.

Hand Sanitizing and Covid-19 checks – Before you enter the Church you will be requested to use Hand Sanitizer.

Face Masks – Face coverings must be worn upon entering and exiting the building. It is recommended to wear them during services

No Books – While you are welcome to bring your own books, no books will be available to borrow. Everything you need will be on the screen.

Shorter Services – In order to keep close contact with other people to a minimum, the Services will be noticeably shorter.

Sacramental Worship – The Administration of the Sacraments will be very different from what we are used to.



Approved Engineer On Sunday 28th November a large number of Parishioners gathered for the morning service to bid farewell to our Rector and friend Rev. Mark Lennox. For the past three and a half years Mark has been a faithful minister, he has preached the Gospel, led Parishioners to faith and walked beside so many families with compassion as they have faced life's challenges.

Rev. Mark may have only been here for 3.5 years but during his short time in Killyman he really did make a massive impact. He was a devoted Rector and he welcomed Rev. Rodney Blair and Rev. Chris West to train under his leadership. Services and Bible Study were always planned to perfection and included so much prayer and praise as well as words of challenge.

Rev. Mark was always quick to roll up his sleeves, whether it was cleaning the kitchen, helping at Craft Class, setting up the hall, building Santa's Grotto, joining in with Holiday Bible Club, helping to train the Parish Choir for an Ordination, flower arranging, playing the organ or guitar, organising the Men's Morning, making soup for the Ladies' Quiet Morning, leading the singing at the Burns Night or organising the pilgrimage to Israel.

When the Covid-19 Pandemic hit in March 2020, Rev. Mark encouraged the length and breadth of the UK and beyond with his 'Facebook Live thoughts for the day.' He moved from preaching to a packed church to a video camera and all that preparing for online services required. We were blessed with two services online each week, an interview in the Rector's study most weeks, The Killyman Wave, The Rainbow Song recording, and the ability to move the weekly Prayer Meeting and Bible Study online.

As restrictions lifted between the 2020 and the 2021 Lockdowns, we were thankful to be able to meet for Drive In Church and then as restrictions eased, we met indoors again for public worship.

It would be remiss to not mention the late Mrs Heather Lennox. Mark's Mum, Heather was a major support and encouragement for Mark, her sudden death left a massive void for Mark. As a Parish we are all the better for having known her and truly thankful for all that she did in Killyman for Mark and us. We will never forget her beautiful voice as she entertained us at Burn's Night and her gentle nature as she spoke. We continue to pray for the Lennox/Thompson family circle.

Throughout Rev. Mark's ministry the Parish has been constantly reminded of our need of God and as Rev. Mark moves to pastures new, he goes with our blessing, heartfelt prayers, love and good wishes. To God be the Glory for sending us a devoted shepherd and friend- he will really be missed.

Rev. Mark will be instituted as Rector of Donacloney Parish on Thursday 6th January 2022. Due to Covid-19 restrictions the service will be by invitation only. It is hoped that the service will be live streamed. Details will be shared on Parish social media channels nearer the time.

Three simple tips for staying argument free in your family this Christmas

For many of us, the lure of a 'perfect' Christmas lurks in our subconscious. Advertisers play into this desire for serving the best food, the home looking super cosy and festive and everyone wonderfully 'suited and booted'.

The reality of Christmas is, of course, always different. It often involves anxiety, tensions and arguments in between the stockings and the crackers.

The pressures may be even greater after last year's Christmas in lockdown and the threat of shortages this year. So here are three simple tips to help you avoid some of the stress and have a happier time as a family this Christmas.

Firstly, share – and maybe reset – some of your expectations with family members. It's so easy to go on autopilot, and play the usual roles at Christmas, whatever they look like in your family. This often leaves one person – often Mum – carrying the burden of it all.

Instead, sit down for a few minutes with your other half and talk about your expectations. What would both of you like your celebration to be, and what don't you both want to happen? Having this kind of simple conversation gets a lot into the open and will enable you to plan together and share ideas too.

Secondly, be proactive. If you're the one who generally organises and does the shopping, wrapping, cooking etc, be proactive and ask for help and support. You may have to accept that others do things differently, and maybe not up to your standards, but a team effort gets everyone involved as well as spreading the load (even sulky teenagers will usually do their bit when asked.)

If you're the partner of the chief organiser, then be proactive in offering support. Tip: instead of saying: "Do you need any help?" (Where the answer is often "I'm ok...") Ask: "What can I do to help today?"

Thirdly, deal with the little things before they become big things. Our natural ways of handling conflict often work against us, and instead make conflict worse. Conflict avoiders will try to avoid awkward conversations and get prickly and defensive. The rhinos will charge in and shout.

Whether you're more like a hedgehog or rhino in an argument, try instead to nip problems in the bud by recognising your own rising feelings and finding positive solutions *together*: "I'm feeling upset about ...what can we do differently?"

The great work of St Columba

It was 1500 years ago, on 7th December 521, that St Columba, an missionary who spread Christianity in Scotland and the North of England, was born in Ireland, (formerly known as Scotia) in what is now County Donegal.

Columba – also known as Columcille – was

one of the Twelve Apostles of Ireland, who studied under St Finnian in his monastic school, Clonard Abbey. He was also a great-grandson of the Irish King Niall, and he was said to have left Ireland primarily because he had caused considerable bloodshed at a battle stemming from his illegal copying of the Gospels.



But he became a missionary after he landed on Iona – a tiny island off the west coast of Scotland – and, with his 12 followers, built a Celtic church and established a monastic community.

lona quickly became known throughout Europe as a missionary centre and school: it turned into a place of pilgrimage for centuries to come — and still is, though none of Columba's original buildings have survived. His cell and outlines of the original monastery were uncovered by excavations in 1958 and 1959.



He spent much time in Scotland, but Columba's final years seem to have been spent mainly on Iona, where he was already revered as a saint. He is now the patron saint of Derry (before it became Londonderry). He and those associated with him spread the gospel more than any other religious pioneers in Britain.

In the Irish language his name means "dove", which is the same as Jonah in Hebrew.

ATTENTION ALL HALL USERS –

Important Information

At a recent meeting of the Select Vestry the latest guidelines from the Church of Ireland were considered and the Select Vestry agreed the following protocols for the re-opening of the Parish Hall to Parish Based Groups.

- All hall bookings <u>must be</u> made via the Parish Office and booked for no more than one month in advance.
- Groups/users must complete and submit a full risk assessment for their organisation/ meeting to the Parish Office no later than 24 hours before each meeting. A template of a Risk Assessment is available from the Parish Office upon request.
- On each Risk Assessment, each group must identify the person who is responsible for ensuring that the room being used is fully sanitized when the group has finished using the hall. Training will be provided for those named.
- No more than two groups will be permitted to use each room in any one day.

 This is to allow time for the sanitizing products to work properly. Groups who normally meet weekly, may have to consider bi-weekly meetings or change of day for the time being.
- Catering/ In-House prepared refreshments are not yet permitted at any meetings.
- On entering and exiting any building everyone should sanitize their hands.
- The Foyer should not be used for dropping off, waiting for or collecting hall users. Where possible, the entry and exit points should be the nearest external door. (E.g. Bush Hall users enter and exit via the Fire Exit. Killyman Hall users enter and exit via the external door beside the kitchen.)
- Any user displaying symptoms should not attend meetings.
- Face masks must be worn at all activities taking place in the Parish Hall, except for seated business meetings which are not accessible to the general public (e.g. Select Vestry Meetings). However, it is recommended that masks be worn at all times regardless of the activity.
- Social distancing continues to be adhered too.
- Windows (or external doors where the windows can't be opened) in the room being used must be opened to allow for ventilation.

While it is a positive step in being able to re-open to Parish Groups, we would ask all users to please be patient and adhere to all the guidelines as we do our best to keep everyone as safe as possible. Thank you for your co-operation.



A Note from the Treasurer

2021 has been another year of disruption due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Church services were severely disrupted early in the year. In-building services returned in the spring, initially in the Parish Hall and more recently in our Parish Church. We have all had to get used to booking to attend, shortened services, hand sanitizing, mask wearing, track and trace and social distancing. This 'new normal' looks as though it may well be with us for some time to come. Attendances at Church Services have been much lower than in 'pre-Covid' years, due to the restrictions placed upon us. Some parishioners are, understandably, still hesitant about mixing indoors and have not felt able to return to communal worship in Church, while others have 'got out of the routine of going to Church'. The activities of Church organisations have also been affected. These, too, have had to adjust to new ways of operating.

All of these disruptions have, inevitably led to a reduction in the Church income. As with all Churches, the major part of our income comes from direct giving by our parishioners. In 2020, our income from this source was approximately 15% less than in 2019. So far, this year, direct giving has increased but is still significantly below what it was in 2019. Savings in our expenditure have been made by reduced electricity and oil usage and reduced printing costs. We have also made use of the government's furlough scheme.

With significant increases in the cost of electricity and oil due in the near future our Church will be even more reliant on the continued, generous financial support of our parishioners to enable it to carry out God's work here in Killyman.

If any Parishioner has been unable to make their annual donation to the Church but would like to, it can be left into the Church office (open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 10.30 am to 1.30 pm.): or it can be given to a friend or neighbour to be put on the collection plate at a Church service; or it can be left with me or the Freewill Offering secretary (Mrs.Lesley Stretton).


While many parishioners increase their giving, perhaps not every year, but at least every few years, there a some whose financial contribution remains the same as it was ten and in a few cases as much as fifteen years ago. If these parishioners were able to increase their giving it would greatly help our Church to meet its financial obligations in the years ahead.

The Gift Aid Scheme and Planned Giving.

During the past year a number of Parishioners have signed up to give their donations to by standing order, through their bank and the Church is very grateful to them. These regular donations allow the Select Vestry to, more easily, plan for future expenditure. If you wish to set up such a standing order, please contact the Parish Office or the treasurer.

The Gift Aid Scheme allows the Church (as a registered charity) to claim an extra 25% on donations made through it. For the Church to claim this, the donor must be a UK income tax payer and must have signed a declaration form. We are very grateful to all the parishioners who have already signed a declaration. If there is anyone who may be eligible and has not signed a declaration form, please consider doing so. It could mean extra income for the Church without any further expense to you. Please contact the treasurer or Parish Office for details.

Over time people's circumstances change and they may no longer pay income tax. If you signed a declaration form in the past but no longer pay income tax, then the Church must not claim Gift Aid tax relief on your donations. If this applies to you please contact the Parish Office or treasurer, so that the tax relief is not claimed in error.



Happy New Year

The month of January is named after the Roman god Janus, who is depicted as having two faces. As we look back on a difficult year dominated by the pandemic, how should we look forward to 2022 with fresh hope? The apostle Paul writes: 'But one thing I do: forgetting what is behind and straining towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus.' (Philippians 3:13,14).

Firstly, to make a new start, you need to *forget the things which are behind*. Paul saw himself as an athlete running for Christ and purposely not looking back. He refused to allow his past sins and difficulties to define who he was. By God's grace, he no longer saw himself that way. The same can be true of ourselves, as we confess our sins and failures to receive God's forgiveness and new life.
