This is demonstrated by the cross, which is the supreme demonstration of God's love. He died for our sins to give us access to God's love, which is made real in our lives by the Holy Spirit.

God's love is forgiving: According to the film Love Story, 'Love means never having to say you're sorry.' Yet Jesus' love for us enables us to forgive others, as we find His forgiveness through the gift of eternal life, available to all who put their trust in Him.

In this World Cup Year, we remember Bobby Moore describing the terror of receiving the World Cup from the Queen in 1966: "I noticed that the Queen was wearing some beautiful white gloves. I looked down at my hands and they were completely covered with mud!"

Although we approach God with dirty and spoilt lives, because of His love, we can shake hands with a holy God and share that love with others.

Christian Basics

For many today the universe began with a big bang, in which a lump of matter, smaller than a pinhead, exploded 15 billion years ago. It's a story that defines who we are and where we come from. However, the Bible gives us another perspective on this event, revealing God as Creator: 'By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible' (Hebrews 11:3). What does Genesis 1 say about God as Creator?



'In the beginning, God'

Whereas science can offer answers about the **how** of creation, the Bible tells us about the **why** i.e. the purpose of the Creator! Creation reflects the character and glory of God, inviting a response of dependence and praise!

'God created the heavens and the earth'

God shaped the universe, as expressed in the '6 days' of creation. They speak of an ordered and purposeful universe that expresses God's will: He spoke and it was done! An alternative translation is 'God began creating', reminding us that creation is also an ongoing process, where the Holy Spirit is still at work in our lives and world.

'God created man in His own image'

In the account, human beings are presented as the climax and crown of creation. We share the sixth day of creation with other creatures, as well as 95% of the same DNA. However, we are distinctively made in the *image of God*, created for relationship with God, with a responsibility to care for the created order.

'And God saw that it was good'

Like an artist, God described His work as *good*. We should always approach this story with wonder, enjoying God's world and affirming creativity in ourselves and others.







BCM Christmas Appeal


Thanks to everyone who donated toiletries to support the BCM Christmas appeal. The large quantity of donations was greatly accepted by the BCM team.







Did you know it was:

175 years ago, on 11th Feb 1847 that Thomas Edison, American inventor and businessman was born. Best known for inventing the first practical incandescent light bulb, phonograph, movie camera and projector, and many more.

100 years ago, on 28th Feb 1922 that Egypt gained its independence from the UK.

90 years ago, on 27th Feb 1932 that British physicist James Chadwick announced his discovery of the neutron subatomic particle in the journal Nature. He was awarded the 1935 Nobel Prize for Physics for his discovery.

80 years ago, on 8th Feb 1942 that the Battle of Singapore took place. The Japanese then occupied Singapore until September 1945. This is regarded as the worst disaster in British military history, with about 80,000 British, Indian and Australian troops captured.

75 years ago, on 7th Feb 1947 that the first of the Dead Sea Scrolls were found in caves in Khirbat Qumran (now in the West Bank, Palestine).

70 years ago, on 6th Feb 1952 that Princess Elizabeth ascended the throne following the death of her father, King George VI. She was in Kenya at the time and became the first Sovereign in over 200 years to accede while abroad.

65 years ago, on 16th Feb 1957 that the Toddlers' Truce was abolished in Britain. During the Truce, television admissions closed down for an hour so that young children could be put to bed. Children's programming ended at 6pm and adult programming began at 7pm.

60 years ago, on 20th Feb 1962 that John Glenn became the first American astronaut to orbit the Earth. He made three orbits in the space capsule *Friendship* 7.

50 years ago, on 9th Feb 1972 that the British Government declared a state of emergency over the miners' strike which began in January. From 16th February, electricity supplies to homes and businesses were cut off for up to nine hours a day. The strike ended on 25th February.

Also 50 years ago, on 18th Feb 1972 that the House of Commons voted narrowly in favour (by eight votes) of joining the Common Market (now the European Union).

25 years ago, on 22nd Feb 1997 that scientists at the Roslin Institute in Edinburgh announced that they had successfully cloned a mammal for the first time: a sheep named Dolly.

20 years ago, on 4th Feb 2002 that Cancer Research UK was founded. It is the world's largest independent cancer research and awareness charity. Also 20 years ago, on 19th Feb 2002 that NASA's Mars Odyssey space probe began mapping the surface of Mars using a variety of imaging systems. It later discovered huge reservoirs of underground ice.





Archbishop Desmond Tutu

The recent death of Archbishop Desmond Tutu was mourned around the world. Here are five of his more famous quotes, which show why he was so especially honoured for his justice and reconciliation work in South Africa.

"Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world."

"If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor. If an elephant has its foot on the tail of a mouse, and you say that you are neutral, the mouse will not appreciate your neutrality."

"Don't raise your voice, improve your argument. Good sense does not always lie with the loudest shouters, nor can we say that a large, unruly crowd is always the best arbiter of what is right."

"Forgiving is not forgetting; it's actually remembering – remembering and not using your right to hit back. It's a second chance for a new beginning. And the remembering part is particularly important. Especially if you don't want to repeat what happened."

"Differences are not intended to separate, to alienate. We are different precisely in order to realise our need of one another."

Requirements for In-Building Worship Services

Watch Social Media for current updates and guidelines.



In line with recent correspondence from the Archbishop the following restrictions are still in place:

Social Distancing – We are still required to stay at a social distance of 1 metre from each other while at "In-Building" worship.

Seat Allocation – Pews/ Seats will be allocated on a first come, first served basis. The Church has to fill from the front and empty from the back, row by row. Once all available seats are used then no one else is permitted to enter. We are temporarily making our services a ticket only event – meaning that those who wish to come need to book online or phone the Parish Office and reserve a place each week.

Track and Trace – a list of everyone in attendance needs to be kept for the purposes of Track and Trace.

Hand Sanitizing and Covid-19 checks – Before you enter the Church you will be requested to use Hand Sanitizer.

Face Masks – Face coverings must be worn upon entering and exiting the building. It is recommended to wear them during services and they must be worn when singing.

No Books – While you are welcome to bring your own books, no books will be available to borrow. Everything you need will be on the screen.

Shorter Services – In order to keep close contact with other people to a minimum, the Services will be noticeably shorter.

Sacramental Worship – The Administration of the Sacraments will be very different from what we are used to.






Killyman Radio 106.5FM





CMSI Global Update

Dear DRC link parishes & supporters,

A camp for Internally Displaced People in Ituri Province was attacked on 29th November. Just six hours north of our partners in Butembo, this infringement on a place of refuge, a makeshift home for those who have already fled their homes, is a stark indication of the present state of Eastern Congo.



I recently joined with our partners in a two-day CMS
Africa Zoom event, discussing how to make disciples in
areas of conflict. One of the exercises was, for each
diocesan group, to draw a map of their area and pinpoint
the resources and challenges. Every single diocese had a
part of the map shaded off, as an area where they could
not go because of the presence of armed groups. Some
dioceses explained they could not safely travel on the
roads outside of main urban areas. When a diocese
mapped an area of cobalt, gold or petrol these were
highlighted as challenges: a would be blessing that brings
international interest, resulting in conflict instead of local
prosperity.

This news of DRC is painful, and so the persistent ministry of the Eglise Anglican du Congo (EAC) is something that we want to continue to uphold as a bright light of real hope for communities wishing for an end to conflict. That Church leaders would meet for two full days to discuss a strategy to ensure discipleship is done well, in spite of conflict, is testament to the tenacious strength and faith of the EAC in Eastern Congo.

EAC peace centres in each diocese ensure that one-onone care and comfort are available for those who are impacted by the conflict. The Provincial Youth Officer, Bisoke, told us of the violence near one of the peace centres recently; thirty-two people were killed and burned one day and the next day, one hundred and seventy brutally killed and their houses burned. On the Sunday of that week, 11 people were baptised. Bisoke said in his email:

"Even though people are running there is someone still coming to Jesus. Praise the Lord. Please pray for us."

Here, in the power of God to bring salvation to those who believe, is confidence in the face of evil. Let us not fail to wait with our Global Partners in prayer this advent.

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned. (Isaiah 9:2)

North Kivu Diocese

Bishop Isesomo recently travelled to Ghana to attend a preaching programme with the Langham Partnership. Thank God for his safe travel and the inspiration and training he enjoyed there. Bishop Isesomo has a vision for evangelism and discipleship in the diocese. Let us pray for him as he considers all that he has encountered with the Langham Partnership.

Rev. Emmanuel, husband of Mama Mbambu of the children's project, was appointed Diocesan Secretary at the November Synod. Pray that his recent time of study in Uganda will be a blessing to the diocese.

Pray for Mama Mbambu and the growing number of children at the children's project. Thank God for this compassionate response of the diocese to children separated from their families because of the war.

Here is a great reason to do some housework:

Older people who regularly do household chores have better memory and attention spans than those who avoid domestic duties.

Not only that, but housework is linked to superior leg strength in people over 65. That means their risk of a fall is reduced.

The study, published in *BMJ Open*, found that a combination of light housework, such as washing up, dusting, making the bed, hanging out laundry, ironing and cooking – and heavy housework, such as window cleaning, changing bedding, vacuuming, washing the floor, and chores involving sawing, repairing or painting, "was associated with higher cognitive function" among older people, who showed up to 14 per cent higher attention span scores than older people who did not do housework.

So there you have it. Now, if anyone wants practice there's always plenty of housework available at my house!
